In June 1776, representatives of the 13 colonies then fighting in the revolutionary struggle weighed a resolution that would declare their independence from Great Britain. On July 2nd, the Continental Congress voted in favor of independence, and two days later

its delegates adopted the Declaration of Independence, a historic document drafted by Thomas Jefferson. From 1776 until the present day, July 4th has been celebrated as the birth of American independence, with typical festivities ranging from fireworks, parades and concerts to more casual family gatherings and barbecues. Board News & Notes by Cal Westra

Your board of directors met in June to discuss the business of the Palomar Mountain Early V8 Club. We passed a resolution that provides better guidelines of membership renewals and aids in the truly publication of our annual roster. Dues are due and payable on January 1st and become delinquent February 1st. Members who have not paid by the regular monthly meeting in March of each year will be dropped.

When the initial battles in the Revolutionary War broke out in April 1775, few colonists desired complete independence from Great Britain, and those who did were considered radical. By the middle of the following year, however, many more colonists had come to favor independence, thanks to growing hostility against Britain and the spread of revolutionary sentiments such as those expressed in Thomas Paine's bestselling pamphlet "Common Sense," published in early 1776. On June 7, when the Continental Congress met at the PennsylvaniaState House (later Independence Hall) in Philadelphia, the Virginia delegate Richard Henry Lee introduced a motion calling for the colonies' independence. Amid heated debate, Congress postponed the vote on Lee's resolution, but appointed a five-man committee –including Thomas Jefferson of Virginia, John Adams of Massachusetts, Roger Sherman of Connecticut, Benjamin Franklin of Pennsylvania and Robert R. Livingston of New York–

to draft a formal statement justifying the break with Great Britain.

On July 2nd, the Continental Congress voted in favor of Lee's resolution for independence in a near-unanimous vote (the New York delegation abstained, but later voted affirmatively). On that day, John Adams wrote to his wife Abigail that July 2 "will be celebrated, by succeeding Generations, as the great anniversary Festival" and that the celebration should include "Pomp and Parade...Games, Sports, Guns, Bells, Bonfires and Illuminations from one End of this Continent to the other." On July 4th, the Congress formally adopted the Declaration of Independence, which had been written largely by Jefferson. Though the vote for actual independence took place on July 2nd, from then on the 4th became the day that was celebrated as the birth of American independence.

<u>Interesting Fact:</u> John Adams believed that July 2nd was the correct date on which to celebrate the birth of American independence, and would reportedly turn down invitations to appear at July 4th events in protest. Adams and Thomas Jefferson both died on July 4, 1826--the 50th anniversary of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence.



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"A Pipe Dream"

Growing up on a farm provided a lot of work and chores that needed to be done but went unrewarded. There was not much opportunity to make any money like a city kid could with a paper route, mowing lawns, etc.

I would pour over the "Sears" and "Montgomery Ward" catalogs and dream about what I wanted to buy. I knew the page numbers and descriptions by heart on the shotguns, bicycles and baseball gloves.

I made a little money working in the hay fields, selling black walnuts and trapping rabbits, which I could sell for 25 cents, but it was not much.

Missouri is famous for its "corn cob" pipes and the "hill billy" image, especially in the resort areas.

I saw an ad in a farm magazine where you could grow a special type of corn and sell the corn cobs to the manufacturer of corn cob pipes. This sounds like it was "tailor made" for a ten year old boy looking to make some easy money. According to the ad, you had to be sixteen years old to qualify for the free seed corn and become a supplier of the special corn cobs used for the corn cob pipes.

I "became sixteen years old" when I sent in my letter to get the free seed corn and become a supplier, how would they know I was only ten?

The more I thought about this arrangement, the better it seemed. I would start off small and every year get bigger and bigger. We had plenty of land to plant and this could be big!

This all came about in the fall of the year, so I had all winter to get things ready for spring planting. I counted the number of seed corns they sent me and tried to determine how large an area to prepare.

I plowed by "special corn field" in the fall and hauled in manure from the barn. I would plow it again in the spring before planting. Well, spring time rolled around and I was ready to plant my special seeds. I followed their directions and planted two seeds in each hill, about twelve inches apart.

It did not take long for some corn to appear and I was out there every day hoeing weeds. I did not know what to expect, but the corn grew like "Jack and the Beanstalk!"

After a couple of months, the corn reached sixteen feet tall and the new ears were over six

feet high. I could not believe the size of the corn that was setting on— it was hugs! I picked one just to check it out and it was white kernals with little blisters of corn, almost all cob!

I had to use a corn knife and cut down the stalk to reach the ears of corn. The directions stated that it was necessary to take off all the husks and put them into burlap bags. I was careful to use only the perfect ones and was able to fill nine large burlap bags that I could barely lift.

The corn cob pipe manufacturer was bout sixty miles from our farm and I wrote them and stated how much I had and asked what to do with it. Our neighbor hauled livestock to St. Louis and he was willing to drop it off for me at no charge.

I received a receipt in the mail stating they received my corn cobs and I would be getting a check shortly. I had no idea how much to expect but it should be quite a lot! A couple more weeks went by and my long awaited check arrived. I about fell over when I saw the amount: \$2.33.

After countless hours of work, my hopes, dreams, and schemes were all gone. This was a scam and they played me perfectly, a lesson that would remain with me for over 50 years.

The next summer, I went to work for a neighbor driving a tractor with a side delivery rake to bale hay. I had to wait a coupe more years until I was twelve, and had enough money to buy my first ford, a 1925 Model T Roadster. I think this experience caused me to keep this very car, which I have now owned over sixty years!

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

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


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
