ELECTRIC FUEL GAUGES

The Electric Fuel Gauge as used on 1936 Ford cars and Trucks is identical in operating principle with the oil pressure gauge as used in 1935 cars (see January, 1935, Service Bulletin) and consists of two units; the Fuel Tank Unit, and the Gauge Unit. A wire connects these two units and the circuit is completed through the car battery and ignition switch. (See figure 476.)

The Tank Unit contains two contacts which are always touching until the circuit is completed by the closing of the ignition switch. The closing of the ignition switch permits the current to flow through the heating coil formed around the bimetal arm.

Due to heat from this coil the bimetal distorts to the point where the contact is open. The bimetal then cools and bends back to its original position, which again closes the electrical circuit. This cycle of opening and closing is thus repeated continuously. With tank half full of fuel this frequency amounts to approximately 60 cycles per minute.

Connected in series with the heating coil of the Tank Unit is a similar coil formed around a bimetal arm in the Gauge Unit. As heating takes place in the Tank Unit heating also takes place at the same time in the Gauge Unit, causing the bimetal arms in each unit to distort simultaneously and in equal amounts. By linking the gauge pointer to the Gauge Unit bimetal arm the amount of distortion and, therefore, the measure of gasoline is recorded.

As the fuel level rises a greater distortion of the bimetal arm is required to open the heating coil circuit. In other words, both heating coils are operating for longer intervals of time than at the lower gasoline level. This causes greater distortion of the bimetal arm in the Gauge Unit and a higher reading is registered.

When tank is empty, as in figure 474, the two contacts in Tank Unit are just touching. With the ignition switch on, current flows through the circuit warming up the heating coil which causes the bimetal to bend. This bending of bimetal in Tank Unit opens the contacts and circuit is broken—the heating coil then cools and the bimetal returns to its former position. Contacts is then again made and the procedure is repeated.

Since both heating coils are in the same circuit, a similar slight bending of the bimetal in the Gauge Unit occurs which is just sufficient to make the needle register zero.


When the tank is filled, as in figure 475, the action of the float and cam pushes the grounded contact against the insulated bimetal contact bending the bimetal in the Tank Unit. If the ignition switch is on, the action described in the preceding paragraph occurs but because the bimetal is under strain a much greater amount of current is required to bend the bimetal sufficiently to break contact in this position. A similar greater bending of the bimetal in the Gauge Unit occurs and this action pulls the needle over to the full point.

The movement of the needle in any position caused by the make and break of the circuit is so minute that it cannot be detected.

Because the bimetals heat and cool slowly any sudden change in fuel level caused by driving over rough roads, etc., are dampened out, and a steady reading of the average level in the tank is given.

Service Instructions

Caution: Do not replace any unit until tests have been made which prove it to be defective or damaged. Handle all units carefully. Never subject Gauge Unit alone to full 6 volt current beyond 3/4 scale reading as this will burn out heater coil.

GETTING TO KNOW YOU: MARY & NICK CACCI!

Mary Cacci has the hands of a woman who is no stranger to work. It's difficult not to notice the 70-year-old Valle Vista woman's short, rough nails and callused hands when she holds up a photo of the 1944 Harley-Davidson Knucklehead that carried her to her wedding and honeymoonlt was on that chopper that she and her husband of 47 years, Nick Cacci, rode with friends to get married Aug. 10, 1968, in Reno, Nev.That monster of a wedding sled, with its modified exhaust pipes and extended forks, would be but a hint of a future in which rebuilding and restoring just about anything with a motor would play a central role in their lives and relationship. The backdrop of their love story, as it were. "She's my best friend," Nick said. "We do everything together. Sometimes the guys would think it was a little weird, because I always wanted her with me."Married couples are nothing new to the car club culture the Caccis belong to as members of the nonprofit Hemet Valley Cruisers and the loose band of gearheads and hot-rodders, the South Side Axle Draggers, based out of southwest Riverside County. They stand apart, though, in that Nick, also 70, and Mary do most of the work on the cars themselves. During the course of their marriage, they've rebuilt, restored and gotten rid of nearly 25 cars, several motorcycles, a couple boats and a motor home or "She helps me with all the cars," he said. "She does all the hard work." "I wash all the cars when we go to car shows," Mary said. "He just gets in and drives." all

In reality, Nick does most of the heavy lifting working on the engines, front ends and all the things that make his vehicles go, but he also does metal fabrication and rudimentary upholstery work. He usually does more than 80 percent of his cars, by his estimation Mary, however, gets dirty, too. She lapped the valves on the engine of their 1940 Ford Coupe. But it's body work and prepping the cars for painting where she really shines. As they get ready to roll their stock-perfect '64 Ford Falcon to the first Salvation Army Hemet Custom Car Fair on Saturday, it's in the garage this couple feels most at home, where Nick spends hours almost daily working on his current fleet that includes a complete 1923 Ford Roadster, an in-process 1940 Ford Coupe and what will be his wife's 1951 Ford sedan with a chopped top. Nick, a retired Sacramento firefighter, has been working on cars and bikes since he was 15. Mary, on the other hand, has



been putting in her time in garages since the early '70s, when she became a professional masker in a body shop. Her job was to prepare a production line of cars for paint and body It's here where Mary diverges from the car club wives she knows. She said some of the ladies do hang around the shows, come over for barbecues and socialize, but inevitably Mary's penchant for hanging around the garage comes up in conversation"They always get on me," Mary said. "They all have long fingernails, go get their hair done and toes done. They ask me to go, but I tell them, 'I got to go sand this' or 'I have to go tape that.' ... They want me to stop and they tease me.

If she plans to start listening, it won't be any time soon. The Caccis are looking to hit the road for an extended vacation in a motor home in the near future, and they are working on their 1992 Fleetwood Flair RV to get them there. Mary recently spent a full workday masking off the rear of the RV, sanding smooth the body work. Then Nick came in and painted it in 20 minutes."I should learn how to paint," she said, giggling. "It's not fair; he has the easy part."Hemet Valley Cruisers President Fred Rock sees the Caccis as a breed apart. Among his club's membership, which focuses on faithful re-creations of American muscle cars, Mary and Nick are unique. At 70, the Caccis are relative voungsters in the Valley Cruisers, and most of the club's 60-plus members no longer work on their own cars, opting for others to do the work or buying complete. And for certain, Rock said, no women are working right alongside their husbands as a team the way Nick and Mary do. "Mary is a gearhead," Rock said. "What you have with them is the same thing you have in life - a family that prays together stays together. But for them its cars."




