# THE DARK SIDE OF MONEY LENDING

Hello to all! I'm going to recount some of the darker sides of the money lending business that I experienced in my 30 year career in that field. First of all, dealing with money in any form usually becomes a very serious matter.

I can't think of any item or product that has the ability to cause human beings too 'fight to the death' over money. With that in mind, here is an experience I had in the field of lending money.

Back in the '50's and '60's there existed a variety of Finance Companies - those lenders who provided cash loans or financing to borrowers who, for whatever reason, didn't meet the strict guidelines set by banks. These finance companies - Household Finance (HFC), Beneficial Finance, Seaboard Finance Company, and a host of smaller lenders, filled the needs of many. Yes, they charged higher interest rates than the banks simply because they experienced a higher default rate, but served a large percentage of the population. They're all gone now because the simple act of borrowing money has changed so much, what with credit cards, credit unions, and a host of other sources.

I went to work for Seaboard Finance Co in November of 1960, beginning my 30 year career in the field. 'Back in the day' cash loan requests were granted by holding the pink slip to the borrower's car, or even accepting the borrower's furniture as collateral. For larger loans, a second mortgage was created as collateral. Unsecured loans were also granted in amounts up to \$1000 to A+ borrowers - those folks who had an excellent record of paying their obligations on time.

In the lending/financing field there is always the potential for the borrower to default on his/her debt, forcing the lender to seek legal means in an attempt to 'be paid back'. I'm going to tell you a story about a borrower from whom I was assigned the task of getting 'paid back' for my employer.

The borrower had agreed to place a second mortgage on his home to secure a \$30,000 loan. Things went well for 3+ years, but then his business began struggling, and he could no longer afford the monthly payments on our loan. We had to foreclose and take possession of his home, and I was assigned the task of driving to the property, after he had vacated, to inspect it, change the locks, etc. Here's what I found: 1) He had removed all of the lighting fixtures in the kitchen ceiling, cut all of the wiring, and smashed the beautiful sink areas with a sledge hammer. 2) He had used a keyhole saw to cut into the wall of every room that had an intercom speaker and removed same 3) The sinks and toilets in every bathroom had been destroyed with a sledge hammer. 4) Carpeted areas had been soaked with motor oil. But here's his final 'statement;'

The front door had been left partially open so that, when I entered the home, the feces he had deftly deposited on the entry tile would be propelled onto the living room carpet as I pushed the door fully open!

That, my friends, is the nasty side of the loan business.

Our Benedict Castle/Car show trip was a giant success. We had a tour guide who gave us so much overwhelming information regarding the Castle. We learned about the original owner and why he had this Castle built and the architectural nuances and all the owners of the castle since it was built in 1919. The Catholic Church owned it for several years, and many of the Religions Crosses and Statues still remain.

The current owners of the castle are an organization named: "Teen Challenge". They began in Brooklyn, NY and now have facilities nationwide. They are a faith based organization with the mission to help anyone overcome any type addiction. A person must commit to 1 year staying at the facility. Some of their facilities are for teens, some for women, and Benedict Castle helps men 18 and older. The organization's success rate is 87% as compared to private facilities 22% success. And all Teen Challenge Facilities are FREE. They survive on donations and fund raising.

# Classic Cars vs Vintage Cars: Everything You Need to Know

An <u>analysis of online searches</u> by ClassicCars.com uncovered regional preferences, state by state, to find the most popular antique cars in all 50 states. Unsurprisingly, muscle cars came out on top, with various model years of the Dodge Charger being the most-searched collectible car across the United States, helped no doubt by nostalgia for the famous General Lee on TV's Dukes of Hazzard. The Charger was followed closely by the likes of the Ford Mustang, Chevrolet's Corvette and Camaro, and the Pontiac Firebird. Throw in the Chevrolet El Camino, Ford Bronco and Pontiac GTO, and it's clear to see the affection that buyers have for good ol' Detroit iron.

Offering us the view from an auction house on cars for sale, Wurl says, "There will always be a big market for muscle cars and pony cars in the U.S. We've also found that mid-century and newer European sports cars continue to dominate the marketplace here. We handle a lot of examples of Porsche, Ferrari, Maserati and Aston Martin, and there continues to be a lot of enthusiasm for those marques."

### Vintage Car Age: When Does a Car Become a Vintage Car?

Finally, there are what are called vintage cars. Vintage car age can vary greatly depending on where you are. What constitutes a vintage car depends on who's defining it, but, as a rule of thumb, it's a car that was built before 1930 (1925, by some definitions). So, it's a car from the very early days of motoring except anything that has been modified into something like a hot rod.

## What Kind of Cars Are Considered Vintage Cars?

Within this classification are very early cars from what's known as the Brass Era, named for the brass fittings that were used as lights or radiators in the automobiles built between 1896 and 1915. As Wurl says, "There's actually been a very robust marketplace historically for those cars and that's continued. There's still a really strong market for quality Brass Era cars." (CONT. The whole vintage car market has, perhaps surprisingly, a big following among collectors, as Wurl notes, "There's still a lot you can do with the early American cars like the Model T. The main enthusiasm remains in coach-built bodied cars: As the general market for cars of that era here in the U.S. shrinks, the cream is really rising to the top. So, a special coach-built automobile—whether it be a Packard, a Cadillac, a Lincoln or a Duesenberg—is always going to hold its value better, and retains a certain level of enthusiasm, even in a marketplace where that market is shrinking."

And, while some of the cars in this market can cost as much as \$10 million, Wurl also says that the entry price can be a lot lower: "You could certainly buy an old Model T for less than \$10,000, and you could also buy a Model A Ford that will get you into all kinds of driving events."

### Questions to Ask Before You Buy Your First Classic vs Vintage Car

What should you buy when it comes to classic vs vintage cars? Chances are, you're looking to lay down a decent chunk of change on your classic car or vintage car, so you need to think about exactly what you want—and why.

The most important consideration is that you must want the car. As Peter Haynes, a consultant with auction house <u>RM Sotheby's</u>, says: "To anyone who really loves the hobby, they will only ever advise that somebody buys what they love. That's the only solid bit of advice you can really give anyone. If you like something, don't obsess too much about whether you think it's the car that is going to do the best financially for you or not. Because if you own a car that you don't like, there's simply no point: There's no pleasure in the ownership. People really ought to be led by their hearts, primarily in terms of choosing either the era of car or the type of car that they want."

As Wurl adds, "You also want to decide what's important to you. Usability is a big thing: you might want something that keeps up with modern-day traffic that you can use on public roads. Or you might want something where there is a large club community or something that is very high performance. Those are all considerations. I think it helps to work backward from what your goals are and what you want to do with a car when it comes time to decide which example to pull the trigger on."

It's also worth considering how easy it will be to maintain the classic car and obtain spare parts. The rarer the car, the more difficult it will be to get spares. It's also harder to find an expert mechanic for it. That will mean more time off the road and, as a result, fewer opportunities to enjoy driving it.

Once you've zeroed in on the car that makes your heart beat faster it's time to let the heat into the equation and get some proper advice. Wurl says: "We always recommend that people talk to some sort of an expert who can help them make an educated decision. There's often a large sum of money involved and there are plenty of cars that have flaws. It's important to find someone who can point those flaws out to you, so you don't make a mistake when it comes time to purchase."


